I write this letter not as the superintendent of your school, but as a resident of the Reedsville School District. In my three plus decades in education I have lived in five communities. I can say, without reservation, I've never been prouder to be a resident of a school district than I am today.

In the past several months we have heard the names Herbert Hoover and Franklin Roosevelt more times than any time in my life. We have been told countless times that the current economic climate is the worst in eighty years. We learned about massive lay-offs on the coasts and in the Rust Belt of the country. Then, like a rolling fog, the news of lay-offs spread to neighboring states, then to neighboring counties, and then to our friends and family here at home.

At the same time, due to shortsighted legislation passed some fifteen years ago, your school found its very survival in question. Additionally, the sixty year-old high school needed upgrades and was threatened by a deteriorating wall meant to protect it from the surrounding creek. It seemed as though a "Perfect Storm" was hovering above the district.

And then, April 7 arrived. In a process, developed in Greek city states long before Christ was born, our residents stepped into the voting booth and made critical decisions about the future of their school.

As I write this letter, one week after the election, I am still overwhelmed by the results. None of us are immune from the impact of the current recession. Yet, a majority of our residents voted to increase their taxes so their school could not only survive, but thrive. I stand in awe to your commitment.

To those who voted no on one or both of the questions, I say thank you for voting. It was very important that people express their opinion on the future of our school and I'm confident that your decision was deliberate and justified. One of our country's early leaders once said that democracy was the worst form of government, unless you compared it to all of the other forms. I've been in the minority countless times in my life and, although at times have been very disappointed, when I think of the thousands and thousands of men and women who have paid the ultimate price in defense of our form of government, I can live with the results.

So, the people have spoken; the die is cast. Because of your courage in the face of adversity, your school will not just survive, but will be better suited to address the needs of our children, so as to prepare them for the jobs in the global economy of the 21st century.

For in the end, it is about our children. Every generation wants a better life for the next generation. Your vote last Tuesday kept intact the 150 year, unbroken string of commitments to educating our youth in the Reedsville School District.

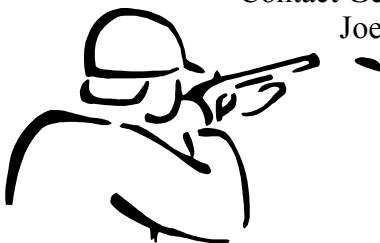

Promoting Skin Care

Aching to enjoy the warm springtime weather? Even though the sun's rays feel amazing after a cold, dreary Wisconsin winter and provides our bodies with vitamin D, the sun does more harm than good when giving you a summertime glow.

Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer that affects around one million Americans each year. It is necessary to take precaution when going out into the sun.

The most common forms of skin cancer are called basal cell and squamous cell. These types of cancer form like any other cancer; a group of abnormal cells begin to form and grow at a rapid pace. Eventually, this forms a tumor.

Basal cell and squamous cell cancers rarely spread. These types of skin cancers are very curable; however, they must be caught early. If left too long, the lesion may get larger, which would require more tissue to be removed.

The most serious form of skin cancer is called malignant melanoma because this cancer forms in the melanocytes. Melanocytes are cells that make melanin, which is a chemical that makes skin tan and protects the deep layers of tissue from the sun. Melanoma tumors can be brown, black or have no color at all. Melanoma can almost always be treated, but as with other cancers, the earlier it is detected the better, since it has the ability to spread and become more deadly.

Those at greatest risk for skin cancer are people with fair skin that sunburns easily; people with blonde or red hair with blue or green eyes; and those who have already been diagnosed with skin cancer. You should be cautious if you have a sore that doesn't heal because this can be linked to basal cell carcinoma, or if a mole happens to change in color, size or shape.

To decrease your chance of getting skin cancer, follow these four steps: wear sunscreen every day even if it is cloudy, limit sun exposure, avoid the times between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. when the sun is strongest, and watch your skin for anything unusual.

Following these steps will not only reduce your risk of skin cancer but will also decrease the chance of wrinkles and leathery skin, keeping your skin looking young and fresh.

CHANGE YOUR BRAIN, CHANGE YOUR LIFE

On March 28, 2009, Nature's Sunshine held a seminar in Kohler featuring the work of Daniel Amen, M.D. Dr. Amen is a clinical neuroscientist, psychiatrist and brain enhancement expert and is the medical director of the world renowned Amen clinics.

Dr. Amen stated that when you see someone behaving poorly it may not be their upbringing or environment (directly) but a matter of the brain not working properly. Dr. Amen stresses the importance of exercise, healthy foods and supplements, getting enough sleep, and continuing to learn. Dr. Amen conducted a 90-day trial using Nature's Sunshine Products with a before and after scan on the participants. We saw the scans and the results were amazing. Bicycle Registration: All bicycles must be registered. To obtain the license, flag down a Village Police Officer. A \$2.00 fee covers a one-time registration.

Curfew: Any person under the age of 18 unaccompanied by a parent or legal guardian may not be out and about between 11:00 PM - 6:00 AM Sunday through Thursday and 12:00 PM - 6:00 AM Friday and Saturday.

Open Book: The assessment roll for the Village of Reedsville will be open for inspection on May 4, 2009 from 4:00 pm to 6:00 pm in the hall of the Reedsville Municipal Building, 217 Menasha St., Reedsville. To schedule a time to discuss an assessment with the Village assessor, Please contact the Village Clerk-Treasurer at 920-754-4371 during normal business hours.

Board of Review: The Village of Reedsville will hold its first meeting on May 19, 2009 from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM, in the hall at the Reedsville Municipal Building, 217 Menasha Street, Reedsville, WI. Please contact the Clerk/Treasurer at 754-4371 for the procedural requirements if you want to appear before the Board.

Vehicle Nuisance: It is illegal for any partially dismantled, non operating, wrecked, junked, unregistered or discarded vehicles to be placed or stored on any public or private property within the Village limits for a period of longer than five (5) days, unless said vehicles are stored within an enclosed building. This ordinance does not apply to property zoned for the sale or repair of vehicles. Having a vehicle behind your garage or under a tarp does not meet the requirement of an enclosed building.

Open Burning/Fire Pits: Controlled burning must be located off the public street pavement or street gutter, must be at least fifteen (15') from any lot line and may not be less than fifteen feet (15') from any building. Only clean wood may be used in fire pits and flames cannot extend more than two feet (2') above the pit. All fires must be monitored by a responsible person until the fire has extinguished itself completely. Persons utilizing and maintaining outdoor fires shall be responsible for any liability resulting from any damage caused by their fire.

Reminder – Pool Owners: You must document, in writing, the starting and ending meter readings and the dates when filling the pool to qualify for the swimming pool discount.

Use Permits for ATV & Golf Carts expired on December 31st. To obtain a new permit you must show proof of insurance and pay the \$20.00 fee. The 2009/2010 permits can be purchased at Jim's Service & Car Wash, 305 Manitowoc St.
