## Notes from the Village Hall

**Payment of Property Taxes:** Real estate and personal property tax payments can be made in person at the Reedsville Municipal Building during normal business hours. Payments may also be made by sending a check to the following: Reedsville Municipal Building, Tax Collection, 217 Menasha St., Reedsville, WI 54230-8597. A receipt will only be sent back if you have included a self-addressed stamped envelop. All first installment taxes are due by January 31, 2010. The Village appreciates all taxes be paid by check or money order made payable to the Village of Reedsville.

**Cat & Dog Licenses:** Unspayed females and unneutered males are \$10.00 each. Spayed females and neutered males are \$5.00 each. You must show proof of a valid rabies shot. Please make out a separate check for the licenses as it goes into a different account.

**Garbage Collection** during the holidays will be Saturday, December 26, 2009 and Saturday, January 2, 2010. It will resume its normal collection on Friday, January 8, 2010.

**Recycling Pick-Up:** December 11<sup>th</sup> & 26<sup>th</sup>

**Effective immediately**, the employees of the Village of Reedsville will no longer be picking up appliances. In the event an appliance needs to be picked-up, residents are required to contact Larry's Hauling to schedule the pick-up. Their phone number is 682-1919.

**Nomination Papers** for Village Trustee can be picked up at the Clerk/Treasurer's office during normal business hours. The completed forms need to be returned on or before January 5, 2010.

**Clerk/Treasurer's office** will be closed Dec. 21st thru Dec. 24th, December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2009 and January 1st, 2010.

**Reminder to Parents:** If you have a children who would like to vote as absentee voters, contact your Municipal clerk and request that an application for an absentee ballot be sent to them. If they are not a registered voter, the Municipal Clerk will also send a registration form along. There is a possibility that there may be four (4) elections in 2010.

**Winter Parking Restrictions:** No person shall park any vehicle on any street or alley in the Village between two-thirty (2:30) AM to six (6) AM of any day from November 1 to April 1, unless permission to do so is received from the Police Department. **YOU MUST OBTAIN PERMISSION EACH YEAR**, so if you had permission for last winter (2008/2009), you must obtain permission for this winter (2009/2010). Even with permission, vehicles may not be parked on any street or alley when we receive snow. Lack of vehicles on streets and alleys allow the Village employees to clean up in a more timely fashion. ## Getting enough vitamin D?

Many of us take vitamins. But, do you know about Vitamin D? Vitamin D is known to have various benefits to it. It helps to improve mood, especially over the dark winter months, build strong bones and helps to boost immunity.

When vitamin D is combined with calcium, it can promote bone health and reduce the risk of osteoporosis. Calcium plays a major role in building bones and a body cannot properly absorb and utilize calcium without adequate intake of vitamin D.

There are vitamin D receptors on the body's immune cells. If our vitamin D level is higher, the white blood cells are more effective at killing germs.

There is very little vitamin D found naturally in the foods we eat. Coldwater fish is the best source of vitamin D, but vitamin D can also be found in milk, breakfast cereals and margarine.

It is found that only 30% to 50% of the general population has a high level of vitamin D. Although vitamin D is found in the sun, it's still not enough to carry us through the winter, because the angle of the Midwest sun is so low that the skin does not get any ultraviolet rays, which it needs to make vitamin D.

It's recommended that people take 2,000 International Units of vitamin D3 each day during the winter to keep their vitamin D levels at an optimum level during the winter to help with the "winter blues" and to keep our immune system revved up to help fight infection.

Of course, covering coughs and washing hands are also important things to do to stay healthy as well.

Just think, one vitamin can do so much for our health.



### SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Just a brief note on Veterans Day before I update you on the progress of the addition/remodel project at the high school. We had a great Veteran's Day program at the Elementary/Middle School on the 11<sup>th</sup>. We estimate there were more than 800K-12 students and community members in attendance. It was a wonderful program, easily the best I have ever attended. While all veterans and current service members were honored, the focus was on those who served in Vietnam. We were privileged to see the Flag-Folding Ceremony with an explanation of what each of the thirteen folds signified, a MIA/POW ceremony, a moment of silence while a soldier honored the dead, and names of those who served and are no longer with us were read and each name was accompanied by a student holding a small flag.

It was truly a moving experience. I couldn't help but think about the ceremony and pageantry every military throughout history adopted, not simply because it seemed like a good idea, but to demonstrate the discipline, honor, and reverence so deserved by each and every warrior.

So too it is with these United States. May we never take that service for granted or fail to honor the sacrifice of those who protect us. God bless all our veterans, past and present.

Now on to the high school.

On the addition, walls continue to rise with the accompanying infrastructure (electrical, plumbing, technology, and heating). Interior walls are also being built, some floors are poured, with others waiting until the roof is completed. The wet fall slowed us some, but the following nice weather allowed a catch-up, so we are close to being back on schedule.

Inside, the demolition of the FACE, staff workroom, bathrooms, and new art room is almost complete. New floors were poured in the art room and both bathrooms in that area. Part of the FACE room floor was also replaced. The power to the new electrical service was completed and conduit is making its way down the west and main corridor.

The new hallway on the northwest corner, leading into the vocational/technical areas is almost completed. We anticipate the bathrooms, art room, vocational print center, FACE room and the staff workroom to be completed prior to Christmas. Phase two will be focused on the second floor of the west wing. That entire area will be empty of students for about three months. On the financial end, we also have good news. Because of the new funding sources created by the effort to stimulate the economy, we are borrowing money at very low or no interest. We estimate those sources will save us over \$3 million of the project totals. So, things are moving very well.

I'll provide another report in January.

## Winter Tire Update

Is your car ready for winter? Good tires are essential for safe winter driving.

Tires must combine three fundamental features to deliver good wintertime performance, including an appropriate tread design, pliable tread compound and sufficient tread depth. If any one of these fundamental features is absent, the other two, regardless of their ability, cannot deliver the desired results!

Since engineers can develop cutting-edge tread designs and chemists can develop advanced rubber compounds, it is often the remaining tread depth that is the variable in determining wintertime performance.

Evil Tuning also recommends that drivers expecting to encounter snow-covered roads consider replacing their tires when they reach approximately 6/32" of remaining tread depth to maintain good mobility. Tires need more tread depth in wintry conditions to compress snow in their grooves and release it as they roll. If there isn't sufficient tread depth, the "bites" of snow that can be processed on each tire revolution will be reduced to "nibbles," and the vehicle's traction and mobility in snow will be reduced.

Fortunately winter tires are typically molded with deeper tread depths than summer or all-season tires, and many of them also feature Winter Wear Indicators to identify that a tire's tread depth remains suitable for beneficial snow performance. While few all-season tires have Winter Wear Indicators molded into their tread designs, their winter snow traction will also pass the point of diminishing returns when their treads wear down to approximately 6/32" of remaining tread depth, at which time they should be replaced.
