## The Red Poppy on Memorial Day

American Legion Auxiliary members of the Gosz Novak Unit 199 of Reedsville understand the sacrifice our Armed Forces have made to preserve freedom and to honor past and current service members. Members of the Gosz/Novak Unit 199 will wear a red Memorial Poppy, as a symbol of the price of war and the sacrifice of millions, as a sign of their appreciation this Memorial Day weekend.

The 900,000 members of the American Legion Auxiliary, the world's largest women's patriotic service organization, are asking everyone to wear a Poppy on Memorial Day weekend. "Wear it in honor of the millions of Americans who have willingly served our nation, all too many of whom made the ultimate sacrifice", said Jane Kalies, local Auxiliary President. The Poppy also honors Wisconsin's disabled veterans at the Zablocki VA Medical Center in Milwaukee who make the red crepe paper Poppy. Wisconsin's Red Poppies provide financial and therapeutic benefits to these veterans, as well as the thousands of veterans and their families who benefit from the donations collected from the distribution of the Auxiliary Poppy.

In the battlefields of Belgium during World War I, poppies grew wild amid the ravages of war. The overturned soils of battle enabled the poppy seeds to be covered, allowing them to grow and forever serve as a reminder of the bloodshed of war.

Each year the Gosz/Novak Auxiliary Unit chooses a Poppy Princess from their Junior Members. This year the Poppy Princess is, Elly Kasper, daughter of Wade and Kathy Kasper, and granddaughter of member Bonnie O'Connell all are from Reedsville.

## Reedsville Heath Fair on May 5th

A Health Fair for members of the public 18 and over is being sponsored by Reedsville High School's FCCLA (Family, Community, and Career Leaders of America) on May 5 from 8:00 to noon in the high school library. A vast array of free information, samples, and prizes will be available.

The event will feature free heart health screenings that include a fasting lipid panel, glucose, body mass index, blood pressure, and personal counseling with a health professional by Calumet Medical Center. Dermatology Associates will conduct skin cancer screenings. Both of these screenings require preregistration by calling the high school office at 754-4341 by April 28.

Many interactive displays will cover topics such as the importance of full body activity by the YMCA, functional movement by Brillion Orthopedic and Spine Care, and exfoliating hand scrubs by His and Hers, Whitelaw.

Presentations by Dermatology Associates from 9:30 - 10:30 and Brillion Orthopedic and Spine from 10:30-11:00 will be held in an adjacent room. No preregistration is required.

Additionally, groups such as the Reedsville First Responders, Manitowoc County Public Health Nurses, Reedsville School Nurse, Holy Family Rehab Plus, 24/7 Fitness of Reedsville, Festival Foods, the Blood Center/Wisconsin Organ Donation, and WEA Trust will sponsor many other educational and interactive displays.

While the fair is geared to adults, Reedsville High School students have also prepared information and will sponsor booths on topics such as stress management, tobacco cessation, and healthy treats.

**Bicycle Registration:** All bicycles must be registered. To obtain the license, flag down a Village Police Officer. A \$2.00 fee covers a one-time registration.

**Curfew:** Any person under the age of 18 unaccompanied by a parent or legal guardian may not be out and about between 11:00 PM - 6:00 AM Sunday through Thursday and 12:00 PM - 6:00 AM Friday and Saturday.

**Board of Review:** The Village of Reedsville will hold its first meeting on May 10, 2011 from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM, in the hall at the Reedsville Municipal Building, 217 Menasha Street, Reedsville, WI. Please contact the Clerk/Treasurer at 754-4371 for the procedural requirements if you want to appear before the Board.

**Vehicle Nuisance:** It is illegal for any partially dismantled, non operating, wrecked, junked, unregistered or discarded vehicles to be placed or stored on any public or private property within the Village limits for a period of longer than five (5) days, unless said vehicles are stored within an enclosed building. This ordinance does not apply to property zoned for the sale or repair of vehicles. Having a vehicle behind your garage or under a tarp does not meet the requirement of an enclosed building.

**Open Burning/Fire Pits:** Controlled burning must be located off the public street pavement or street gutter, must be at least fifteen (15') from any lot line and may not be less than fifteen feet (15') from any building. Only clean wood may be used in fire pits and flames cannot extend more than two feet (2') above the pit. All fires must be monitored by a responsible person until the fire has extinguished itself completely. Persons utilizing and maintaining outdoor fires shall be responsible for any liability resulting from any damage caused by their fire.

**Pool Owners:** You must fill out the Swimming Pool Discount Application to qualify for the swimming pool discount. No other form of submittal will be accepted. This form can be picked up at the Reedsville Municipal Building Lobby.

**Dogs Or Cats:** It shall be unlawful to own, harbor, shelter, or keep any dog or cat which runs at large within the limits of the Village. A dog or cat shall be deemed to be running at large when it is on any public street, alley, parks, or other grounds of the Village or any other premises in the Village other than the premises of its owner, his servant, agent or a member of his family of suitable age and discretion unless it is on a durable leash no longer than eight feet (8') or the dog or cat must be under control and within eight feet (8') of its owner, his servant, agent or a member of his family of suitable age and discretion at all times when off the premises of its owner.

We **CAN NOT** issue burning permits to burn plastic, garbage, treated or painted wood or rubber.

## Wake up to the signs of Sleep Apnea

Obstructive sleep apnea is a common sleep disorder estimated to affect more than 12 million Americans. The word "apnea" means a pause in breathing.

With this disorder, a person repeatedly stops breathing for short periods of time during sleep. Warning signs include a pattern of loud snoring interrupted by pauses in breathing, with snorts or gasps before breathing resumes.

People suffering from sleep apnea may be completely unaware they have this problem. Family members and bed partners are often the first to recognize it.

Losing weight, managing a nasal allergy or infection, correcting a nasal deformity or removing tonsils and adenoids can help this condition. In severe cases, surgery on the throat and palate may be recommended to reduce excess tissue and widen the air passage.

The most common non-surgical treatment for sleep apnea, however, is nasal Continuous Positive Airway Pressure (CPAP). A CPAP mask fits over the nose during sleep and a mechanical device gently pushes air into the mask and into the airway.

Untreated sleep apnea is associated with a higher risk of potentially serious health problems, such as:

- high blood pressure
- increased risk of heart attack and stroke
- depression and irritability
- erectile dysfunction in men

If you think you or someone you know suffers from obstructive sleep apnea or another sleep disorder, help is available.

We know Ginger will always have a place in everyone's heart for many years to come. We know she made a difference in many of your lives. So the following is how Amber & Ginger made their way to Sunrise Horse Farm.

We were only looking for 1 horse when we started the search for Cassie. In the back of my mind I was worried about her riding alone. So it really made sense to be looking for 2. My husband didn't really see it that way. He saw that it was just going to cost us more.

BUT, it was meant to be. An ad for 2 mares & tack located between Algoma & Kewaunee near the Ahnapee trail. Come to discover that she wanted to sell together. They needed each other. The one didn't like losing sight of the other.

It was a beautiful day when we went out to see them. We saddled them up and went down the road and around the corner. Some cars even buzzed by and they didn't flinch. They were well behaved.

A few days later, I went back with my horsey gal pal and met a vet to check them out. For their age (20), they were in pretty good health and didn't see any major issues. Deal was done. We had some work to do. Barn wasn't quite ready and there was some brush to clear out in the woods. Making sure the fence was secure and work, etc. Oh yeah, we needed to find someone with a trailer!
