Recall Primary Election: There will be a recall primary election on **Tuesday, May 8th** for Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Polls will be open at the Reedsville Municipal Building, 217 Menasha St., from 7:00 am until 8:00 pm

Bicycle Registration: All bicycles must be registered. To obtain the license, flag down a Village Police Officer. A \$2.00 fee covers a one-time registration.

Curfew: Any person under the age of 18 unaccompanied by a parent or legal guardian may not be out and about between 11:00 PM - 6:00 AM Sunday through Thursday and 12:00 PM - 6:00 AM Friday and Saturday.

Board of Review: The Village of Reedsville will hold its first meeting on May 15, 2012 from 2:00 PM to 4:00 PM, in the hall at the Reedsville Municipal Building, 217 Menasha Street, Reedsville, WI. Please contact the Clerk/Treasurer at 754-4371 for the procedural requirements if you want to appear before the Board.

Vehicle Nuisance: It is illegal for any partially dismantled, non operating, wrecked, junked, unregistered or discarded vehicles to be placed or stored on any public or private property within the Village limits for a period of longer than five (5) days, unless said vehicles are stored within an enclosed building. This ordinance does not apply to property zoned for the sale or repair of vehicles. Having a vehicle behind your garage or under a tarp does not meet the requirement of an enclosed building.

Open Burning/Fire Pits: Controlled burning must be located off the public street pavement or street gutter, must be as least fifteen (15') from any lot line and may not be less than fifteen feet (15') from any building. Only clean wood may be used in fire pits and flames cannot extend more than two feet (2') above the pit. All fires must be monitored by a responsible person until the fire has extinguished itself completely. Persons utilizing and maintaining outdoor fires shall be responsible for any liability resulting from any damage caused by their fire.

Pool Owners: You must fill out the Swimming Pool Discount Application to qualify for the swimming pool discount. No other form of submittal will be accepted. This form can be picked up at the Reedsville Municipal Building Lobby.

Dogs Or Cats: It shall be unlawful to own, harbor, shelter, or keep any dog or cat which runs at large within the limits of the Village. A dog or cat shall be deemed to be running at large when it is on any public street, alley, parks, or other grounds of the Village or any other premises in the Village other than the premises of its owner, his servant, agent or a member of his family of suitable age and discretion unless it is on a durable leash no longer than eight feet (8') or the dog or cat must be under control and within eight feet (8') of its owner, his servant, agent or a member of his family of suitable age and discretion at all times when off the premises of its owner.

Dogs Or Cats: It shall be unlawful for any person owning or in control of a dog or cat to allow or permit such animal to defecate on any private or public property owned by another unless such person shall remove all feces so deposited by such animal. Violation shall be punishable by a forfeiture of not less than twenty dollars (\$20.00) nor more than two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

Friends of St. Patrick plan a big reunion

The Friends of St. Patrick, Inc. of the Historic Maple Grove is planning a 20th anniversary reunion on September 9, 2012. The first "COME HOME TO MAPLE GROVE" was held on July 5, 1992 after Tom Sheahan, of Red Banks, NJ had researched the Irish community of Maple Grove. Sheahan's ancestors settled in the Maple Grove area when they arrived in America from Ireland back in the early 1800's. With all his genealogical information, Sheahan wrote a book entitled "ALL THOSE FOLKS FROM ST.PATRICK'S", which has information on over 200 pioneer families who settled the area. A 10th anniversary celebration "RETURN TO MAPLE GROVE" was held on July 7, 2002. Tom Sheahan was present at both reunion celebrations, but passed away in 2003. The Friends of St. Patrick, Inc. published his book and copies are still available. The Friends of St. Patrick was organized shortly after the 1992 reunion, and over the years have acquired the old St. Patrick Convent House, which is used as a genealogical center, the St. Patrick Church Building, and have created a Heritage Park. They have planted near 100 maple trees, which have been donated by individuals in memory or honor of family members and founding families.

On September 9th the celebration will be held at the St. Patrick Historic Building, beginning with a 10:30 a.m. outdoor mass. Everyone is invited to attend and enjoy an array of activities planned for the day. The day will include Irish entertainment by David Logan, The Celtic Concorc featuring Michael Murphy, Irish Dancers from DePere, Bagpiper Pete McGinty, The Hussey Brothers, and Irish Harpist Cheryl Murphy. Cemetery tours and a living cemetery will also be part of the activities, as well as guided bus tours of the surrounding farming community. A silent auction and a raffle with cash prizes will also be part of the activities. Food and Refreshments including Irish Stew, the Sisters' Sweet Room (Bake Sale), and Kolache making demonstration and sale, will all be available. Kid's and adults games are being planned.

The September celebration committee is headed by Liz Welch, and included Bernie Strurm, Jane Kalies, Marge Bodwin, Loretta Sheahan, Dotsie, Nate, George & Ann O'Hearn, Gale & Alice Mangin, Art Cafilisch, Jane Kirt, Lenora Sheahan, and Beth Kiel.

Reedsville School WKCE Results

In the Reedsville School District, 292 students in Grade 3 – 8, and 10th grade were assessed on the Wisconsin Knowledge and Concepts Examinations (WKCE) the last fall. In comparison to last school year, Reedsville students demonstrated overall improvement. Students exceeded the State's average in reading and math at all grade levels (with the exception of 4th grade reading). While the scores represent the efforts of students and staff in preparation for the exams, they are also indicative of the quality of education provided in the District.

Scores fall into one of 4 categories: Minimal, Basic, Proficient, or Advanced. The goal is to have 100% of the students in the Proficient to Advanced range. In the Reedsville School District, 87% of the 3rd grade students tested were in the Proficient to Advanced range in Reading. In math, an incredible 100% of the students were in the Proficient to Advanced range (target range). A summary of performance for the entire district is as follows:

Grade 5	89% Reading	86% Math
Grade 6	95% Reading	93% Math
Grade 7	93% Reading	85% Math
Grade 8	85% Reading	91% Math
Grade 10	87% Reading	77% Math

Districts use the results of the WKCE help to guide curriculum planning, and staff development. The Reedsville District will begin the process of analysis of the data to further improve the quality of instruction for our students. It's that time of the year!

Seasonal allergies are a common complaint during spring and summer each year. They impact millions of Americans and result in many lost days of school or work.

Symptoms include itchy, runny, sneezy or stuffy noses and itchy, watery eyes. People with seasonal allergies (hay fever) experience increased symptoms when the plants that cause the sensitivity are actively growing and pollinating. Pollens that are light enough to be airborne trigger the allergic reactions in most hay fever sufferers.

Trees, grasses and weeds all produce pollens during different seasons. As a result, the hay fever season occurs at different times of the year for different people, depending on which pollen(s) they are allergic to.

For example, many weeds flourish in this part of the country from midsummer to late fall. In the late fall, ragweed is the most common problem and causes most hay fever symptoms.

Airborne pollens can penetrate anywhere, indoors and out, and are at increased levels at the height of the pollinating season for that particular plant. Hay fever subsides with the onset of a heavy frost.

Mold and fungus spores are also airborne during the summer and fall months and may cause adverse reactions in hay fever sufferers. The growth of mold and fungus is encouraged by humid weather and poor air circulation.

The difference between a seasonal allergy and other allergies is that a seasonal allergy will subside at some point, depending on where you live and the substance to which you are allergic.

What can people do who suffer from seasonal allergies? Avoidance is the best "treatment" for any allergy, whenever possible. Keeping doors and windows closed and avoiding vigorous outside activity will lessen your exposure when the pollen count is high.

Removing pets from the home and using dust and mold control measures can also significantly relieve symptoms due to perennial allergens.

Antihistamines can relieve many symptoms of hay fever by inhibiting the action of histamine on the nasal and eye tissues. When people first start taking this type of medication it can cause drowsiness, but this usually goes away after a day or two when taking the drug on a regular basis. If drowsiness persists, one of the newer antihistamines that do not cause sleepiness may be more tolerable, although the cost may be higher.

Other treatment options include nasal decongestants, nasal sprays and eye drops that act similar to oral prescriptions and give quick relief to allergic symptoms. In severe cases, allergy shots (immunotherapy) may be the best treatment option.

Unfortunately, once a person develops a seasonal allergy, no matter at what age, it is not likely to go away and will reoccur year in and year out. If you're really bothered by allergy symptoms and over-the-counter medications aren't effective, consult with your health care provider to try other treatment options and medications that have the fewest side effects.
