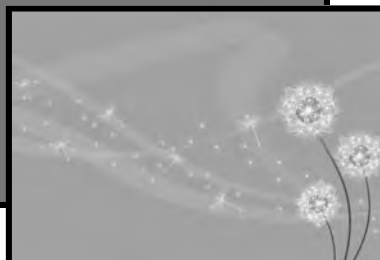

Breast Cancer Screening Saves Lives

Early detection of breast cancer saves lives. Approximately one out of every eight women will be diagnosed with breast cancer during her lifetime.

Having regular mammograms can detect cancers of a smaller size, often months or years before they can be detected by physical examination. On average, mammograms can detect cancer approximately two years before you or your doctor would be able to notice a lump.

With breast cancer being treatable and curable in many cases, every woman should be vigilant about having regular mammograms. A recent advancement to prevent breast cancer and maintain breast health is digital mammography, which is offered at Aurora Health Center in Two Rivers, next to Aurora Medical Center.

Digital mammography is better than film mammography and uses less radiation. Digital images have better detail and allow radiologists to manipulate the magnification, orientation, brightness and contrast of the mammogram image.

I recommend women ages 40 and older have a mammogram every one or two years. Oftentimes, it is helpful for us to review previous mammogram images to compare results; our staff can help obtain those images. For women with dense breast tissue, an ultrasound or breast MRI may need to be performed.

I encourage women to perform monthly breast self-exams starting in their 20s. Self-exams help women become familiar with how their breasts normally look and feel. Please alert your health care provider about any breast changes.

Women—especially those who have a mother or sibling with breast cancer—should discuss their individual risk factors for breast cancer during their annual exam with their health care provider. In most cases, if there is a history of breast cancer in her family, a woman should get her first mammogram 10 years before her relative was diagnosed.

Known risk factors for breast cancer include:

- being a woman over the age of 50;
- having no children or having your first child after the age of 30;
- starting your menstrual cycle early or reaching menopause late;
- being overweight; and
- having a blood relative with the disease.

While new technology may hold the promise of even better detection and treatment methods in the future, mammography screening remains at the forefront in the early detection of breast cancer.

On a separate note, seasonal flu vaccine clinics will be held at Aurora Health Center in Reedsville from 2 to 6 p.m. on Oct. 8, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Oct. 14 and 2 to 6 p.m. on Oct. 20. Appointments are appreciated. Flu shots can also be given during well visits. Call (920) 754-4337 for more details.

Building Contractors need to be registered with the Department of Commerce

As of July 1, 2009, construction businesses working under these Wisconsin codes - commercial building, uniform dwelling, electrical, plumbing, and swimming pool - need a Building Contractor Registration issued by the state Department of Commerce, Safety and Buildings Division, unless the company already holds a contractor credential issued by the division.

The registration is for businesses, including one-person businesses, not for individual employees.
