Remembering Reedsville: Who is George Reed?

George Reed, the founder of Reedsville, was born in 1807.

He attended Middlebury College in Vermont and become very interested in law. In 1834 he moved to Milwaukee, where he was joined in 1835 by his parents and brothers. He soon became a farmer in Waukesha County and became a delegate to the first (unsuccessful) state constitutional convention (1846). In 1850 he moved to Manitowoc County, where he served for several years as county judge. Judge Reed and another pioneer resident, Jacob Lueps, purchased the present town of Reedsville in 1854 – fifty-six blocks in all. At that time, the Village was known as Mud Creek, from the small stream of that name flowing through the village.

Reed died in the Newhall House fire in Milwaukee in 1883, where the lives of 71 of the 300 people in the hotel were killed.

The siren will tone for three (3) minutes.
The Fire Department will also send its emergency vehicles throughout the fire district to warn residents.
You should tune to local TV & Radio for further updates.
The siren may go off multiple times depending on storm status. This means that danger is still present.
There **WILL NOT** be a 1 minute "All Clear" siren tone.
The Reedsville Village Hall will be opened up as an emergency shelter for those that need it.

Free concert to be held at St. John-St. James on the 7th of September

Chris Driesbach is homeless and couldn't be happier. Five years ago, he paid off his debts, sold his belongings and got in his car to travel the country.

Driesbach is a Christian musician, originally from New Orleans. When Hurricane Katrina hit the city, however, the condo he was living in as well as the church he was a member of, were flooded and nearly destroyed. What followed is a wonderful story of rebuilding and rebirth as his church body rallied to restore the church buildings and many members' homes. To Driesbach, that was reason enough to drop everything and hit the road to share his music and his message of thanks.

"It's been a dream of mine to do this," he said. "I'm very grateful to live this way." Chris has performed over 900 concerts in WELS and ELS Lutheran churches in 34 states since then and recorded 5 CDs of original Christian music including songs for children and a collection of favorite hymns.

Driesbach will be performing in Reedsville, September 7th at St. John-St. James Ev. Lutheran Church, 219 Manitowoc Street 635, bringing "a little bit of inspiration, a little bit of joy," according to Pastor Tim Nommensen. Admission to the 7pm concert is free.

The road that led Driesbach to becoming a Christian is anything but average. He grew up in a dysfunctional household, he said, and turned to alcohol at 14 to cope. Before long, the coping mechanism became a long lasting addiction. All the while, Driesbach was a proud atheist, renouncing the idea of a God and willing to debate that fact with anyone who disagreed.

That all changed one morning, however, when Driesbach woke up with the shakes – a slang term for withdrawal.

"It really scared me because I realized I was dying of alcoholism," he said. "I was desperate and I was dying."

Driesbach joined a 12 Step Program for alcoholics and has been sober for 24 years. 9 years later he met a Lutheran pastor who invited him to a Bible Information Class. "That absolutely changed my life," he said, "but I don't take credit for that."

Musically, Driesbach's songs are varied: country, reggae, folk and some rock and roll. The lyrics, however, are much more important, he said. Each song is about his Christian life path, the inspiration he takes from it and the hope he holds for the future.

"I'm having the time of my life," said Driesbach. "I thank God every day for it."

Please don't ignore chronic heartburn

It's estimated that more than 60 million Americans experience heartburn at least once a month, and more than a quarter of them feel the burn every day, according to the American College of Gastroentology.

The unpleasant sensation of burning discomfort behind the breastbone is the most common symptom of gastroesophageal reflux disease or GERD.

Too much stomach acid in the esophagus can cause a painful and irritating inflammation of the esophagus. Chronic heartburn, or GERD, develops when stomach acid repeatedly comes into contact with the lining of the esophagus.

In addition to heartburn, other symptoms of GERD may include chest pain (heart disease needs to be ruled out), hoarseness, trouble swallowing, dry cough and bad breath. If you find yourself using over-the-counter antacids more than twice a week, please seek medical advice so your condition can be properly diagnosed and treated.

Many people think heartburn is uncomfortable, but not necessarily a serious health problem. This isn't true. If heartburn occurs frequently (at least twice a week) it can lead to serious health consequences.

If left untreated, GERD can lead to esophagitis, bleeding and ulcers, Barrett's esophagus (a precancerous condition) or even cancer.

Please talk to your health care provider about the severity and frequency of your heartburn symptoms, since GERD is a very treatable condition, either through lifestyle modifications or drug therapy.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER

Monitoring Requirements Not Met for Reedsville Waterworks

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not your drinking water meets health standards. Between 10/01/2010 and 12/31/2010, we did not monitor for coliform bacteria contaminants, and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of your drinking water during that time. There are no special precautions you need to take at this time. However, it is important to remember that the quality of your drinking water was not known at that time.

What was the cause of the missed monitoring requirements? The sample was not collected due to operator error. However, a coliform bacteria sample was collected on January 5, 2011 and again on June 14, 2011. Both samples were safe.

What is being done to correct the problem? The operator will routinely review the monitoring requirements to make sure samples are not missed.
